Dear Friends,

In two week's time (from when I am writing this) we will commemorate VE Day and in our celebrations, try and capture some of the optimism of that first VE Day, some 80 years ago. But think what the world would be like if human beings actually lived by the Golden Rule.

In fact, it is a year David and I celebrate as our former generations were almost starved to death in the Channel Island of Jersey where our Maternal ancestry lived under the occupation of the German Forces! It was a devastating time, but little did my mother know that on the first Mail Boat entering the Channel Islands upon Liberation would be her future Father-in-law - my Grandfather!

This world, about which I am sure we and those who survived both World Wars dream, would be a world in which all disease would have been cured centuries ago – because the money that has been spent on weapons for 2000 years would have been spent on medical research. This world would be one in which everyone has enough to live on, because the resources of the world would be shared. This world would be one in which nations no longer existed, because neighbours don't divide themselves into nations, because borders are no longer needed. This world would be one in which terrorism and extremism like that of the Nazis, HAMAS and ISIS would simply have no place....because the conditions which create such extremism would not exist.

Until such a vision comes to pass, we need our troops, we need our weapons, we need our campaigners for peace and we need to protect what is ours from those who would forcibly take it away from us. We still need to hold on to our optimism. We can almost taste the optimism of those first VE Day crowds. We may want to bathe in that optimism, and keep crying out that the world really could be that good! If only we would listen to God.

So in this coming month of May, let us celebrate the ending of the war in Europe, and the relative peace we have enjoyed for the last 80 years. Let us give thanks for those who gave their lives for that peace. Let us remember the joy of VE Day and the optimism of all those

crowds. But let us also re-commit ourselves to the task of loving God, and loving our neighbour every day.

We have a VE DAY 80th Celebration at Margam Abbey on Saturday 3rd May at 2pm - All are welcome.

Dear Friends,

Ascension Day, celebrated 40 days after Easter, is a deeply significant event in Christian theology, marking the moment Jesus Christ completed His earthly ministry and ascended into heaven. It is a day of reflection and joy, symbolizing the fulfilment of His redemptive mission and the promise of His eventual return.

According to the Gospels and Acts, Jesus led His disciples to the Mount of Olives, blessed them, and was lifted into the heavens, disappearing from their sight. The book of Acts records that two angels appeared to reassure them that Jesus would return just as He had departed. His ascension signifies His entry into the divine realm, where He now sits at the right hand of the Father, as described in multiple New Testament passages. This position represents His authority, kingship, and the completion of His mission on earth. His departure was not an abandonment but rather a transition, His presence shifted from a physical form to a spiritual reality.

The Ascension stands as the crowning achievement of Jesus' earthly journey. Through His life, crucifixion, and resurrection, He triumphed over sin and death, restoring the relationship between humanity and God. His ascension affirms His divine nature, proving that He was not merely a prophet or teacher but the Son of God, now reigning with the Father. One of the most profound theological implications of this event is Jesus' role as intercessor. The book of Hebrews portrays Him as the ultimate High Priest who intercedes on behalf of humanity. Unlike earthly priests, who offered sacrifices repeatedly, Jesus provided Himself as the perfect sacrifice once and for all. His presence in heaven means believers have a constant advocate who understands their struggles and presents their needs before God.

Additionally, His departure prepared the way for the coming of the Holy Spirit. Jesus had assured His disciples that it was beneficial for Him to leave so that the Spirit could be sent. This promise was fulfilled at Pentecost when the Holy Spirit descended upon the disciples, empowering them to spread the gospel and establish the Church. This pivotal transition signified that Christ's mission was now to be carried forward by His followers, guided by the Spirit. Ascension Day carries profound meaning for the Church. First, it affirms Christ's kingship and authority, reinforcing trust in His sovereignty even when circumstances seem uncertain. The Church acknowledges Jesus as the reigning King, governing both heaven and earth. His ascension also marks the official commissioning of His disciples through the Great Commission, commanding them to go and make disciples of all nations. Rather than being an end, His departure signalled a beginning, the Church was now entrusted with continuing His work on earth.

Beyond its immediate implications, Ascension Day fills believers with hope and anticipation. It serves as a reminder of Jesus' promise to return. Just as the disciples were assured that He would come again, Christians today live in expectation, longing for the day when Christ will restore creation and bring His kingdom to fullness. In the meantime, they are encouraged by the knowledge that Jesus remains at hand, guiding and strengthening them through the Holy Spirit.

This occasion is one of reflection, thanksgiving, and celebration. Worshippers take time to meditate on the glorious reality that Jesus reigns, that His work continues through the Church, and that His return is promised. While some churches mark Ascension Day with processions and prayers, others commemorate it through quiet reflection and renewed dedication to the mission entrusted to them.

For those facing doubts or uncertainties, Ascension Day serves as a powerful reassurance. Jesus' work did not conclude when He left the earth - it continues within the lives of believers. While His presence may not be visible in the same way it was to the disciples, He remains active, offering grace, strength, and guidance.

Ultimately, the Ascension is not a departure to be mourned, but rather a fulfilment to be celebrated. Jesus did not leave to be distant but ascended to be closer in a new and divine way. His reign assures believers of His power and presence, empowering them to live faithfully and with confidence in His eventual return. Ascension Day is a proclamation that Christ reigns, His work is ongoing, and His followers are called to share in that mission, with the steadfast hope that one day, they will see Him again.

My name is Diana Stroia and I am honoured and humbled to serve as the High Sheriff of West Glamorgan 2025-2026. I was officially appointed on 8th April at the beautiful Margam Abbey in a ceremony filled with meaning and tradition. I was installed in the presence of His Majesty's Lord Lieutenant of West Glamorgan, Mrs Louise Fleet JP, the Mayor of Neath Port Talbot County Borough Council, the Lord Mayor of the City and County of Swansea, Her Excellency The Romanian Ambassador to the Court of St James', the Police and Crime Commissioner, the Chief Constable of South Wales Police, members of the judiciary, third sector organisations, inspiring entrepreneurs, and my wonderful family and friends. My focus will be on the wellbeing and safety of our young people, preventing crime and violence by promoting connection, encouragement, and positive support. Also, I will be supporting Thrive Domestic Abuse Services.

Rome

The funeral of Pope Francis and the media coverage of St Peter's square prompted me to share my memories of my visit to Rome.

When in the RAF, in billet on my left was Tony, a member of the Roman Catholic Church. On my right, Michael was a member of the Methodist church. Each, at different times, had asked if I could play their hymns and I played for occasional services at both their churches on the base.

Tony was a member of the group that attended concerts and the opera on a regular basis and became a good friend. He told me he wanted to visit Rome and we agreed we would do this together for Pentecost (Whitsun), which included a Bank holiday. Our RAF passes would take us to the Italian border from where we would have a reduced fare to Rome.

We stayed a night in Cologne and the following day organised the tickets to Rome. This was 1956, all train seats were wooden slatted and no question of sleepers! It was a fascinating 24-hour journey. We had the carriage mostly to ourselves during the afternoon and evening; it was completely ours from about 10pm until 5.30am when people started entraining on their way to market with goats, hens, pigs and other produce! They were a friendly, jolly lot and we were breakfasted on lots of local produce and good hot coffee!!

At Rome railway station a young boy offered to take us to a good hotel; he didn't let us down. We had a room with a balcony overlooking St. Peter's square, which did not have the security measures we see today. We visited the catacombs, the forum and all the usual tourist areas before approaching the Vatican. Here a Swiss Guard showed an interest in these two young, naive Englishmen. When he realised we were servicemen with the RAF he took us on a personal guided tour into areas not normally open to the public. His excuse to his colleagues being we were giving him English lessons!

On Pentecost Sunday I went to St. Peter's with Tony in the morning where I very much enjoyed the music. In the afternoon Tony accompanied me to St George's, the English, Anglican Church where I played for the Communion Service.

I was recently invited to go to a screening of a film made by a Palestinian fisherman who has come to the UK to show the film and appeal for funds. They and their boats seem to be target practice for high speed Israeli gunboats, and are restricted to fishing in small areas. Many have been killed and the fishing (an important source of food in a starving country) is very curtailed. Where wives have taken out the boats of their dead husbands they have suffered similarly.

Inhumanity is nothing new. It is all around us, and history is full of atrocities. Being kind, considerate and sharing brings condemnation from the dominant and greedy. What a sad world we have. The homeless are evident on the streets, while huge expensive houses (with every energy-consuming labour-saving gadgets) fill expanding suburbs and the accompanying big cars use up the world's resources. The less able deserve an equal share, but they are pushed to the margins. Huge gardens are 'essential' while affordable housing cannot find building space. Not in my back yard is the norm: do not lower my standard of living!

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
