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Dear Friends, Fr Jonathan

Firstly, may I wish you a Blwyddyn Newydd Dda. May 2024 be a year of hope, expectation and blessing!

As we will be celebrating the great Paschal Feast of Easter much earlier this year, this is the opportunity to remind you to make sure you have flour, eggs and lemons in the house (or whatever is your preferred pancake ingredients!); to return your palm crosses to church for Ash; or to start reading your Lent book (Fr. Mark's book is widely available and will be a great companion for your Lenten Pilgrimage).

The origin of many of our Lent customs stem far back into our Christian backstory. Shrove Tuesday pancakes were once a way to use up the eggs and fats in the home before Lent began – hence the French name, Mardi Gras. Ash Wednesday is when people go to Church to receive a cross of ashes on their forehead, traced whilst the words "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." are spoken. The Eastern Orthodox experience Lent differently, with no Sundays off for fasting, because they believe increased fasting must be accompanied by greater periods of prayer. The Orthodox also say Alleluias in greater number in Lent, whereas in the Western churches we stop them altogether until the first Mass of Easter on Holy Saturday at the Easter Vigil.

So why do we embark on this period of self-denial, giving alms and meditate upon Jesus' sacrifice for us? The "forty" days follow the time Jesus spent in the wilderness before the public start of his ministry. As we know, forty was a convenient round number in Biblical terms, meaning a considerable length of time. Lent continues through Passiontide and into Holy Week.

So, as we prayerfully fetch our lemons out of the fruit bowl, purchase our Lenten devotions or bookmark our Bible reading plans, may we remember that it's not about earning so-called 'Brownie points,' but rather about deepening our faith and spiritual discipline. So may we ask God for the strength to enable us to do what he desires and follow the example of Jesus.

May our prayer be for all of us as we prepare to prepare, that we

should all have a holy/blessed Lent, without fear of being driven by failure and doubt, but rather encouraged by our wonder at God's love, waiting on his word for any change we could make. It is through this that we can expect our Lent to be different, to experience renewal of ourselves, our faith and Church. As Jesus says, "When you fast, do not look sombre as the hypocrites do," (Matt 6:16) so let us wish each other a Blessed, Holy and Joyous Lent!

Almighty and ever living God,
you invite us deeper into your world, your people, your Lent.
May this time be one of outward focus;
seeking you in those we often ignore.
Help us live a Lent focused on
freedom, justice, generosity, and encounter.
Give us hearts hungry to serve you
and those who need what we have to give.

Dear Friends, Fr Wayne David

I'm using this opportunity for you to get to know me a little before I arrive to serve amongst you.

Born in 1974, my formative years were spent in Pontypridd, where I was a chorister at St John's Church, the Graig (a wonderful introduction to the Anglo-Catholic tradition) and attended Cardinal Newman Roman Catholic Comprehensive School.

I developed my love of music, learning to play the piano, organ and guitar. At 16, I became organist and choirmaster at St Mark's Church, Pwllgwaun, at the same time developing youth work in the parish. In 1993, I left to read education at the University of Central England, Birmingham. I spent 4 happy years working with pupils from a variety of ethnic and social backgrounds. In my final year, I took on the post of Director of Music at St Paul's Church, Grangetown building the choir up to 40 voices whilst enhancing the music in the parish.

After graduating, my first full time teaching post was at Llandough Primary School. After 3 years, I decided to test my vocation to the ordained ministry and attended Ripon College, Cuddesdon, Oxford. After much soul searching, I returned to teaching at Gwernllwyn Junior School, Merthyr Tydfil (now Dowlais Primary). I also became organist at St Catherine's, Pontypridd. I spent several happy years at Gwernllwyn working with people in the Merthyr area including children, parents, parishioners from the Parish of Dowlais with Penydarren, the Merthyr Tydfil Ladies Choir and the Dowlais Male Voice Choir. At this time I felt my calling could be fulfilled through Self-supporting Ministry, with my vocation to teaching and to the ordained ministry working in harmony.

In September 2004, I embarked on the South Wales Ordination Course at St Michael's Theological College, Llandaff (now St Padarn's College). In 2006 I was appointed Deputy Head Teacher at Duffryn Junior School, Newport (now Tredegar Park Primary). It was a challenge to combine theological studies with my Deputy Head responsibilities but the Lord sustained me and I was made Deacon in 2007 and ordained Priest in 2008 by Archbishop Barry Morgan.

My first Curacy was in the Parish of Merthyr Tydfil, St David's, St Tydfil's Well, All Saints Abercanaid and St Tydfil's Old Parish Church. After 3 years I moved to my home Parish of Pontypridd – St John's Graig, St Luke's Rhydyfelin and St Mary's Glyntaff. This was a wonderful paradox - people who had seen me growing up as a child, Altar server, chorister, organist and choirmaster saw me complete my vocation as their Assistant Curate and Priest. Experiencing my Sunday School teachers referring to me as Father Wayne was peculiar but also very humbling. After 6 years, it was time to move on to my own Parish – and this was to take a novel twist, as the Lord works in mysterious ways!

In 2014 I was appointed as full time Chaplain to the Cathedral School in Llandaff and able to merge my two vocations in life – teaching and the Priesthood. I was responsible for the Spiritual Welfare of the whole school community – 800 pupils, 127 staff plus parents, governors, friends and the Llandaff community. I was specifically responsible for the boy and girl choristers of Llandaff Cathedral and came into regular contact with the Cathedral staff. I taught Religious Studies along with Design and Technology. I organised daily worship in the School Chapel alongside 'large scale' weekly school services in the Cathedral. A particular joy for me was the regular need to administer the Sacraments outside the 'school day' to the community. After a happy and fulfilling 9¼ years, I entered a period of prayerful discernment as to where the Lord was calling me and I am thrilled that I shall be based in Porthcawl and the Margam Ministry Area.

In January I turned the grand age of 50. I am conscious that I was the longest serving Deputy Head at my Newport School and the longest serving Chaplain at the Cathedral School. Whilst it is impossible for me to surpass Fr Phillip's record of 30 years with you, I intend to minister faithfully amongst you as long as the Lord pleases. I hope that my focus on daily prayer, pastoral care and celebration of the Eucharist of Jesus Christ will ensure that I truly serve you in the spirit of the 'One who came to serve all'.

In my spare time, I enjoy going to the cinema, cycling, walking, riding my motorbike and playing a variety of musical instruments. I can't

Milking the Pail of Human Kindness

The Prison Chaplain, an ordained Methodist Minister, started her sermon saying, "As I go round the prison I frequently hear the words, "Didn't do it Miss." Very occasionally I actually believe the speaker." At the conclusion of the service the chaplain came to speak to me at the organ. I pointed out one young man indicating that I felt he was one who was telling the truth. "Yes", she said, "It was he I was talking about."

At the time I was the volunteer chapel organist; I drove in to play for the services and went home for lunch afterwards!! I was also a Prison Visitor, which meant I would be asked to meet with prisoners who did not have visits.

My visitees included a young Irishman who, at the time, had spent the second half of his 28 years in and out of penal institutes. He phoned me one day to say the office had miscalculated his sentence and he was to be released in two days. I ascertained this was correct, but unusual and that nothing had been organised to help him. I offered to put him up for two nights while the Probation Service sorted out something for him. I was then going to Germany for two weeks to help a friend whose mother and two aunts had died within six weeks of each other. She'd asked me to drive her to Bavaria where she was to conclude the estate of an aunt. So, off I went to Germany leaving my visitor at the Probation offices to finalise his arrangements.

On my return two weeks later I had been burgled and I discovered my key did not open the front door – the lock had been changed! It transpired, around midnight on the day I left to go to Germany my ex-prisoner had telephoned a locksmith as an emergency; he convinced the man he owned the house, and that I had been visiting, but must have left carrying both sets of keys. He then took on my persona, telling the locksmith he was going to Germany the following day to help a friend at a time of bereavement etc. My neighbours were concerned at seeing all the lights on and called the police. The police let themselves in via keys held by another neighbour and questioned my visitor, now burglar, who convinced them he knew me and had my

permission to stay - he was very plausible (something to do with a Blarney Stone?).

To add insult to injury he made a number of spurious complaints about me to the police for which I was questioned under caution. After about twenty minutes the police decided they were wasting time - I think I still have the recording somewhere!

As a Prison Visitor, I would meet occasionally with the first young man mentioned above. His family were not allowed to make contact with him. We were talking about his release; as it was imminent and nobody was meeting him, I offered to do so. He came out of the prison carrying a black plastic bag – the bag and he stank, terribly.

He explained when he was taken into custody, all his spare clothing had been put into the black bag, held in a store room and nothing had been washed during the few weeks he was incarcerated.

We went to a local supermarket for breakfast, a shopping precinct for new clothes then to my house where he went into the shower and all his clothes went into my washer dryer. Over a cup of coffee he informed me he was feeling human again! I took him to Brecon where I left him to meet his Probation Officer agreeing where we would meet afterwards. The Probation Service had arranged rooms for him in a shared house, but they would not be available for two days, meantime he had been booked into a hotel B & B for two nights. He had been released with a few pounds cash, which would cover only one night B & B. I also stayed in the hotel, attended to his bill and we went to view his 'furnished' accommodation. To describe it as sparse would be over-kind. He went to find local friends. I returned to Porthcawl where with the help of the prison chaplaincy and others we set up his rooms.

I have had occasional messages of thanks and good wishes from him. The last I heard he had completed the Wales Mountain Leadership Course and was commencing training others.

His paperwork proved he didn't do it!

You win some, you lose some, but we allow the Holy Spirit to lead where we must go.




Happy New Year to you all.

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
