As we sit with a stranger who was looking for quiet, as we hand them a candle to light and remember, as we clear up the crumbs from a mum's giddy toddler, what do you believe?

As we stretch out our hands to share Peace and for bread, as we lift up our voices and bow down our heads, as we love one another just like Jesus said - what do you believe?

Do you believe in the Father who flung stars into space, whose benevolent image can be found in your face, who traced lines of eternity into every embrace, do you believe?

Do you believe in the Son, the second person of the Trinity, the three in one, the one who would come and renew us all with a promise to be with us until the Kingdom will dawn - do you believe?

Do you believe in the Spirit? The giver of life? The teacher of Love and the queller of strife, who pours out its gifts at our baptismal start, and makes us one faith, one body, one heart. Do you believe?

Do you believe in the church? The vessel for God's mission, who is called to stay humble and accept the commission to be beacons of hope and children of light until that day comes when we resurrect and reunite with the one who made us. Do you believe?

We stand with the Saints, we join with their praise, in our pews and our chairs all our voices we raise, to proclaim our faith, our Creed, our Way.

Churches Together in Porthcawl

Churches Together in Porthcawl (CTiP) unites in pilgrimage those churches in Porthcawl which, acknowledging God's revelation in Christ, confess the Lord Jesus Christ as God and Saviour according to the scriptures: and, in obedience to God's will and in the power of the Holy Spirit, commit themselves to seek a deepening of their communion with Christ and with one another in the Church, which is his body, and to fulfil their mission to proclaim the gospel by common witness and service in the world. (Basis taken from the constitution).

For more than sixty years the major events involving the churches of Porthcawl have been undertaken by the body now known as CTiP. Porthcawl Council of Churches was founded in 1963.

Churches Together Great Britain and Ireland came into being in 1996 from within the Council of Churches England Ireland and Wales. At the same time Porthcawl Council of Churches made a similar move and became Churches Together in Porthcawl (not Porthcawl Churches Together!). CTiP is affiliated to CYTUN (Churches Together in Wales).

All the Christian churches in Porthcawl 'have the right to four representatives on the full meeting of CTiP with the right to speak and vote, wherever possible one of these four representatives should be under the age of 30 years. Normally, priests and ministers in these churches shall be among their representatives' (from the constitution).

The 3 Anglican churches have always each had four representative places in CTiP and been very active, making a substantial contribution to the work and witness of CTiP. The past rector, Canon Philip Masson was president twice as was Fr Jonathan Durley. SADLY, there is currently no official Anglican representation (I am an Honorary Life Vice-President!).

I will ensure copies of the CTiP Constitution and a short history are in the back of the churches shortly.

In conclusion, my involvement in this work over the past 40 years has been some of the most fulfilling as we pray with Our Lord: That they all may be one (John 17 v 21).





Churches Galore

There are countless church buildings and many church philosophies. From my imaginary position ten thousand miles above planet earth I see both. I can also read of their past and so see why they developed. Numerous congregations were founded by a person or a group to fulfil a need. Disenchantment or even disagreement with what existed caused many breakaway church groups while others came to fill a niche in society; special needs or countering particular evils. So the development of churches has been restless and



continuous, and probably still evolving. Views change, the importance of an idea fades, the world moves on; new situations have to be adapted to. The present, however vital it seems now, will mature, and like fruit, ripen and rot.

Descriptions of Holy Sites and buildings have filled many volumes. They are all wonderful from a mere scrap of a ruin to the grandest Sagrada. Places where people have expressed their feelings, especially hopes. Knowing that good is everywhere one of my most rewarding moments is passing the statue near the Norwegian Church and gently grasping the lower part of the torch of peace and hoping for Peace. Peace within every person, in their family, in their local society, in their country, and between countries. Peace founded on understanding and helping each other, and respect for the planet.



Feb 2024: In good form I broke the rules, asked for an appointment with a doctor because of a heavy cold – it proved to be Laryngitis. April 2024: I asked to see a doctor as my voice hadn't returned. When I suggested the Laryngitis was taking a long time the doctor was quite animated, insisting Laryngitis for two months couldn't be possible and fast-tracked me to ENT! Within 48 hours I had a camera down my throat showing a hole in my vocal cords! (FYI: To reach that part of the throat the camera starts by going up the nose – not pleasant!).

All sorts has happened since, including being told how to eat and drink properly, I confess as an octogenarian that didn't go down too well; (please forgive the pun) but from the start til now there is an insistence: do not cough, do not raise your voice, do not shout, do not talk for long periods, do not sing! The last to the relief of those around me in church!

For more than a year, when in church, I have been saying everything more or less to myself, or reading the words to myself – a new form of joining-in! Many hymns I have known without use of a book for a long time (choir boy from eight then an organist and choirmaster).

I had learned and experienced many years ago the positive use of silence and knowing the still small voice.

This experience has been interesting, and good. Once again coming to terms with words and phrases such as Laud and honour, consubstantial, co-eternal, consummation of peace (and lots more!).

Many of the hymns have been prayers during my daily life with the music as a background in my head. A constant has been the 19th century hymn by Edward Plumptre with the opening words Thy hand, O God has guided, but each verse concluding "One Church, one Faith, one Lord." This incredible hymn encompasses the Church, faith, God, mission, guidance, mercy, plan, sovereignty and victory. Very often when contemplating these words my mind moves back to an RSCM Diocesan Summer Festival in the cathedral in Essex; a number of Methodist churches had requested they join and had been welcomed. The final hymn, Thy hand, O God has guided, was my request. The combined choirs numbered more than 500, friends and relatives

more than doubled the total number creating the congregation. We had spent some time in rehearsal when the altos, tenors and basses repeat the last words of each verse while the remainder sing the word Lord. At the conclusion of the hymn the majority of the congregation, having taken a deep breath were singing 'Lord' while more than 200 Altos, Tenors and Basses sang below them One Church, One Faith, One Lord while I carefully slowed the beat. When I closed the beat the 'd' of Lord was like a clap of thunder through the cathedral. It was a back-of-the-neck tingling moment, even the bishop waited to give us his blessing!

Having spent half my life persuading choirs of all ages to get the diction right it never occurred to me to explain any of the words or phrases – I probably thought that was the vicar's job – though I have always been interested in words and vocabulary. These few months have also made me more aware of those around me in church. I'm now allowed to read in church if there is a microphone and am quite enjoying exploring some of these words and phrases – though still silently contemplating 'consubstantial'!




