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
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Relax, re-charge and refresh!

The Sacrament of Confirmation is an important celebration in the life of the Church, as it marks a person for undertaking the vocation to which they have been called. Confirmation is sort of like Ordination, as it marks you out for a specific calling. But unlike Ordination, the Church confirms both lay people and priests. And this is because every Christian's vocation is to proclaim the Gospel and live a holy life.

This is also why Confirmation is linked to the bishop's presence. As Ordination into the priesthood requires the bishop's presence, so too, in Confirmation, the bishop's presence signifies that the person being confirmed is now charged with the duty of carrying on the apostolic mission, the ministry of those first disciples.

Too often, we have thought that once a person is confirmed, it's the end of the journey. So far from being the end of the road, Confirmation marks a new beginning. It is a new, more profound sense of vocation. Confirmation marks us out for a life on mission, wherever that may lead us.

Mission doesn't just happen overseas. It happens everywhere: in our neighbourhoods, homes, and the ordinary places of our everyday existence. Mission is right where we are, right now.

To reinvigorate and renew the practice of Confirmation is one of the most critical tasks for the church today because renewing the practice of Confirmation means renewing the mission of the church.

It means further equipping all the saints for the work of God's kingdom. It means a rising generation of Christians who have dedicated their lives to the glory of God in every area of life.

So let us continue to pray for those who have received this wonderful Sacrament -

Dear Friends.

On July 22nd, the Church joyfully celebrates the feast of St Mary Magdalene, a woman whose life was transformed by grace and whose witness continues to inspire generations. Often called the "apostle to the apostles," Mary Magdalene stands as a radiant example of healing, renewal, and faithful love. Her story is not one of perfection but of redemption, a journey from brokenness to bold proclamation, from tears to testimony.

Mary Magdalene first appears in the Gospels as one from whom Jesus cast out seven demons (Luke 8:2). This detail, though brief, speaks volumes. She knew what it meant to be healed, deeply, personally, and completely. Her life was not merely improved by Jesus; it was made new. In this, she becomes a living echo of Hosea 6:1–3, where the prophet calls, "Come, let us return to the Lord... he will bind up our wounds... he will revive us." Mary's healing was not just physical or emotional, it was spiritual restoration, a return to the God who heals and revives.

From that moment on, Mary followed Jesus with unwavering devotion. She stood by him in his ministry, supported him from her own means, and remained near even at the foot of the cross when others fled. Her presence at the crucifixion and her early arrival at the tomb on Easter morning reveal a heart that had been captivated by love and transformed by mercy.

In John 20:11–18, we find Mary weeping outside the empty tomb. Her grief is raw, her love undiminished. But then, in a moment of tender recognition, Jesus calls her by name, "Mary." That single word breaks through her sorrow and opens her eyes to the risen Lord. She becomes the first to witness the resurrection and is entrusted with the message: "Go to my brothers and say to them..." In this sacred commission, Mary becomes the first preacher of the resurrection, the first to proclaim new life to a world still shadowed by death.

This moment resonates deeply with 2 Corinthians 5:14–17, where Paul writes, "If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation." Mary Magdalene embodies this truth. Her past no longer defines her; her identity is now rooted in the risen Christ. She is not remembered for

her wounds but for her witness. Her life proclaims that no one is beyond the reach of grace and that healing is always possible in the presence of Christ.

Psalm 71 offers a fitting prayer for Mary's journey: "You have been my hope, Sovereign Lord, my confidence since my youth... you will restore my life again." These words could well have been on her lips as she stood at the tomb, as she heard her name spoken by the risen Jesus, and as she ran to tell the others. Her story is one of restoration, of hope rekindled, of life renewed.

In the life of the Church, Mary Magdalene holds a cherished place. She reminds us that healing is not only possible but promised. Her association with compassionate care is not accidental, many hospitals and ministries of mercy bear her name, inspired by her transformation and her unwavering love. She is a patron of those who seek healing, of those who serve the broken, and of all who long to be made whole.

On her feast day, we do not merely remember a woman of the past. We celebrate a sister in faith who still walks with us, pointing always to the One who calls us by name, who heals our wounds, and who sends us out to proclaim life. St Mary Magdalene, pray for us, that we too may be made new.

We were introduced to each other twelve years ago - he is now 32. He enjoys my visits when we go to castles where he will climb towers, or at the seaside we clamber over rocks avoiding the rock pools. He tells me he knows he must do these things, won't go alone, but feels safe with me – an octogenarian nearing the end of the decade!!

I was visiting him last year and had booked a table for dinner in a restaurant where I was told the booking could be not be later than 6.15pm as the restaurant was booked for the RNLI Annual Fund-Raising dinner but there was a table for two available in the bar. During the afternoon as we were walking along the Waterfront I was explaining I was attending a Diamond Wedding Celebration on my way home the following day and needed to buy a present. A lady had caught up and was passing us, she excused herself, but having heard some of the conversation wanted to explain there were shops ahead and described what was available. We thanked her for the information (although we knew the shops) and she went on ahead.

Later, we presented ourselves at our dinner venue and were seated in the bar studying our menus when the restaurant door opened and into the bar walked the same lady from the afternoon – this time selling raffle tickets for the RNLI dinner! She came straight to us, remembering our previous encounter; we both bought raffle tickets giving our contact details as one does – later that evening I received a phone call: we had each won a prize! Both our prizes were a meal for two: Jon's was at the same restaurant, mine at an inn in a nearby bay.

Jon collected both vouchers and on my next visit we found the Ferry Inn at Llanstadwell and redeemed my voucher. We enjoyed the venue, the reception and the meal so much we have been back three times!

Saving Lives at Sea

Porthcawl RNLI recently held their annual crew dinner and during the evening it was an opportunity to make a presentation and thank Angharad Masson who recently left the crew after 6 years of service.

On the same evening, Porthcawl RNLI also recognised and thanked Etienne Cronje and Dan Jones who had also decided to leave the crew after many years of service.

Etienne joined the crew in 2007 and saved 174 lives during his 18 years of service.

Dan joined the crew in 2008 and passed out as a helm in 2016. During his 17 years of service Dan saved 170 lives.



Angharad joined the crew in 2019 and saved 66 lives during her 6 years of service.

Being part of a volunteer RNLI lifeboat crew is a huge commitment and we are grateful to them all for their service and to their families for supporting them over the years. We wish them all the best for the future.

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Did you know?

- 1 July 1838 British scientist Charles Darwin presented a paper to the Linnean Society in London on his theory of evolution of species and natural selection.
- 5 July 1954—the BBC launched the first daily television news programme in the UK.
- 9 July 1877 the inaugural Lawn Tennis Championship was played on top of the croquet lawns at Wimbledon.
- 11 July 1950 the first episode of the BBC children's TV show Andy Pandy was broadcast in the UK.
- 16 July 1955 Stirling Moss became the first British racing driver to win the British Grand Prix.
- 21 July 1925 racing driver Malcolm Campbell set a new land speed record of 150.87 mph at Pendine Sands in a Sunbeam 350HP becoming the first person to travel over 150 mph.
- 21 July 1969 The Eagle landed on the moon and US astronaut Neil Armstrong becomes the first man to walk on its powdery surface.
- 23 July 1955 racing driver Donald Campbell broke the world water speed record and became the first person to break the 200 mph barrier at Ullswater in Cumbria.
- 24 July 1950 the first rocket was launched from Cape Canaveral in Florida. It reached a height of 25 miles.
- 25 July 1814 George Stevenson unveiled *Blucher*, a steam-powered locomotive that can haul 8 carriages loaded with 30 tons of coal at the break-neck speed of 4 mph.
- 25 July 1959 the first hovercraft crossed the English Channel.
- 27 July 1949 the first successful test flight of the de Havilland Comet, the first commercial passenger jet, took place.
- 29 July 1949 the BBC began broadcasting regular weather forecasts on TV.
- 30 July 1966 England won the Jules Rimet trophy, Association Football's World Cup, at Wembley Stadium in London after beating Germany 4-2 in extra time.

Christian Aid 80th Anniversary Service

Weeks ago an email came inviting me to the service. So I bought a little tent to enable me to stay on the outskirts of London at low cost. It seemed questionable to spend so much on the train fare when it could have gone to the starving, but I tried to make the most from the three day venture.

An hour in Reading to soak up the atmosphere of the Abbey ruins, the Kennet and Avon canal and the gaol site - famous for the ballad - were enjoyed in the sunshine. With the tent sited on the banks of the Thames at Chertsey there was time for a leisurely evening walk by the weir.

Next morning a day rover ticket was bought to ride to Waterloo. I paused at the Windrush monument and walked across Westminster Bridge passing Churchill and Gandhi to join the queue for the Abbey.

My seat was on the end of a row with an unimpeded view of the poppies around the tomb of the Unknown Warrior. The Service at noon was very poignant especially the reading by Rev. Kate Bottley of the Good Shepherd story. I felt very aware of often, and indeed recently, failing to help the needy, especially in Penarth. She was by the door as I left and how warmly encouraging felt her handshake. A Welsh flag outside enabled the handful from Wales to come together. Three were from Penarth.

Then a visit to Westminster Cathedral to nod to Basil Hume and Eric Gill before Canary Wharf (using the Elizabeth line and Docklands Light Railway) and walking the foot tunnel to see the Cutty Sark. Getting tired by now the planned walk to St. James's Park and Trafalgar Square etc. had to be omitted.

On Friday 13th June, the journey home was on six trains, with sightseeing stops in Reading (the Lion), Swindon (Railway monuments) and Gloucester (Docks)

God said. "In a minute."





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
